You are going to hear this a lot when you join us in Costa Rica. It represents Costa Ricans' relaxed attitude towards life, no matter the circumstance. It's used to say hello, goodbye, to express that everything is okay, and to brush off any negativity. It's a way of life, an attitude, and a reminder to us of how extremely fortunate we are to have gained permission to run liveaboard adventures in this truly natural paradise.

Costa Rica is home to 5% of the world's biodiversity with dense jungles, rainforests and national parks, volcanoes, rushing rivers, spectacular waterfalls, sandy beaches and of course, beautiful diving, swimming, kayaking and adventure. We offer 2 different liveaboard based itineraries. Your booking is for Cocos - Island of the Sharks. An offshore oasis in the Pacific Ocean and it's a little different from the mainland. This trip is mainly centric on diving although there should be opportunities to go ashore. The diving is some of the best in the world and we should see loads of hammerhead sharks, white tip reef sharks, tiger sharks and much more and you are going at the time of the year to see whale sharks, and the humpback whales!



### COCOS ISLAND OF THE SHARKS

Embark on an unforgettable 11-days, 10-nights / 10-days, 9-nights summer adventure. Cocos Island is an oasis for marine animals off the west coast of Costa Rica and is spoken of in hushed tones of wonder by divers around the world. The shark diving experience here is legendary.

Rainy season is the peak season for diving in Costa Rica. Best vis. Best animals. Best diving! We encourage you to visit between mid-May to November.

Don't be fooled by the term "rainy season," as it doesn't hinder your adventure. Typically, the days are filled with sunshine until the afternoon, when clouds roll in and rain showers pour for an hour or two, often accompanied by a fantastic lightning display. Afterward, the skies clear up again for the night.



# Sample Itinerary

## 11 Days / 10 Nights Trip

### Bienvenidos a Costa Rica!!

Upon arrival at SJO (San Jose International Airport), we recommend either taking the short connecting flight on Sensa Airlines direct to Golfito. Alternatively, for more of an adventure, consider renting a car for the 6-hour drive and adventure driving down to Golfito. We highly recommend arriving in Golfito at least several days early to take advantage of pre-trip extensions. Located a few kilometres north of Golfito is the magnificent Piedras Blancas National Park, which, like so many other parks in Costa Rica, is almost bursting at the seams with an astonishing array of wildlife. Our concierge team will happily assist with hotel and resort recommendations.

### Day 1 - Boarding day!

We will confirm the marina where the ship is located several months before your departure date. Boarding is at the marina at 7 pm, and the ship will sail at 8 pm. Knowing that most of our guests have to check out of their hotel or resort around noon, you are welcome to drop your gear off any time this afternoon. However, please note that our crew will be working super hard to get your ship ready for you and will not be able to accommodate early boarding. We plan to sail at 8 pm for the 30-33 hour crossing to Cocos.

### Day 2 - At sea.

Your ship is a heavy steel stabilized oceangoing ship, ensuring you the best ride possible. We encourage you to relax, and it's usually a good idea to take some anti-seasickness medicine just in case. It's far better to feel 100% and enjoy the crossing than to risk feeling under the weather without medication... There will be ample time for briefings, setting up dive and camera gear, and, of course, cocktail hour at 7 pm with all our other guests!

### Days 3-9 - Dive. Have fun. Dive some more!

(11 days / 10 night trips get an extra day at Cocos!)

Anchored in the lee of Cocos Island!! Enjoy some of the best diving in the world on the pinnacles surrounding cocos. The choice of dive sites is at the discretion of the park rangers and influenced by Mother Ocean, with a lot of input from your captain and dive guides. Typically, there will be an opportunity for 2 dives in the morning and 1 in the afternoon, with water temps ranging from 78 – 82°F (27 – 28°C). Plus, there's the opportunity to go ashore several times, whale watch with the humpbacks, relax, and have a great time!!

### Day 10 - At sea.

We will be making tracks back to Puntarenas unfortunately. Packing gear up. Visiting with new friends. Planning your next adventure!

### Day 11 - Disembarkation.

Early arrival in port and onto the shuttle by 07:30 am for the reason that most international flights depart between 11:30 am and 2 pm. We should be able to get you back to the San José Airport in good time to make the same day flight home.

## WHAT TO BRING

### What do I need to pack?

Personal toiletries. Dive gear (or travel light and use our rental gear!) Summer wear, noting that nights can sometimes be chilly which makes a sweater or fleece jacket a good addition. Sunscreen (reefsafe sunscreen will be available onboard with our compliments). Towels and bed linen are provided onboard. Good walking shoes are recommended if you want to go ashore on Cocos.

### What dive gear do I need to bring?

We provide aluminum 80 cu. ft tanks and weightbelts. Larger steel rental cylinders are available. 5 mm wetsuit recommended to avoid losing body core temp during multiple days of repetitive diving. It's always better to layer down rather than be cold with no options. We have rentals onboard by prior arrangement for almost anything you need. Please make any rental requests as early as possible.

### Baggage limitations?

Pack lightly since you will be dressing for warm tropical weather. At Customs there are no limitations on the personal equipment such as diving, camera and video equipment as well as computers that are for personal use.

## TRAVEL DETAILS

### Do I need a passport and/or visa?

YES and it must be valid six months from entry.

US citizens do not require an entry visa to Costa Rica. However, they must have a return ticket to exit Costa Rica within 90 days. (Either to return to your country or to go to another country).

Guests visiting us from other countries may not require an entry visa also. Please check the requirements for your country.

### Do I need dive and other insurance?

Cocos Island is a very remote area and the cost involved in evacuating a diver is very high. Guests are required to have medical and evacuation insurance from a recognized provider before participating in any of our activities. Dive Assure is our recommended carrier. They are really great and have always looked after our guests during difficult situations.

The policies are very affordable. We also highly recommend the optional purchase of trip interruption insurance, which covers everything from cancelled flights, weather delays, and lost baggage, to reimbursement if another guest has a medical issue that affects your trip. If you decline coverage, please note that we do not issue credits or refunds for anything that is beyond our immediate control.

### What airport do I fly into?

SJO is the code for the Aeropuerto Internacional Juan Santamaría. Please note there is a San José airport in California so please use the airport code.

### When should I fly in?

[At least one day prior to boarding to avoid any stress from delayed or cancelled airline flights, bad weather at the originating airport, missing luggage, etc.](#)

## DON'T FORGET!

### What time do we disembark?

07:30 am shuttle transfer to San José International airport or the Marriott if you will be staying in Costa Rica for more adventure. Most international flights depart between 11:30 am and 2 pm so this timing gets you there in good time.

### Can you accommodate special dietary requests?

YES - with reasonable advance notice. We are pleased to accommodate vegetarian, vegan, lactose intolerance, gluten-free, low sugar, quasi-kosher and quasi-halal. We are likely unable to accommodate more esoteric special dietary requests.

### What is NOT included in the trip price?

Our ambition is to keep your trip price as low as possible with a la carte options to cater to everyone's personal choices. Crew gratuities are not included. Neither are rentals, nitrox, internet connection, bar charges, and gift shop purchases.

### What fees do I have to pay?

We keep any extra fees to the bare minimum. 5% tax on your trip fee. National park fee per dive day of US\$75. That's it!

### What hotel do you recommend?

Marriott Hotel Hacienda Belen is approx. 6 km from the airport. We will have a hospitably suite and someone from Nautilus at the Marriott from noon onwards to assist you and complete your check-in. We encourage you to leave your luggage with us after you check out of your room. Please keep in mind that there are 2 different Marriott hotels in San José. It's important to book into the correct one.

### How do I get from SJO to the hotel?

On arrival at SJO (San José international airport), we recommend checking in to the Marriott Hotel Hacienda Belen to rest, refresh, and head out for some local adventures prior to meeting at our hospitality suite on the day of boarding. Our Cabo based concierges are on standby prior to your trip to assist with pre-trip questions and hotel reservations. SJO gets very busy when the international flights arrive, and while we can prearrange transfers with pleasure, it's generally easier to hire a local taxi outside the arrivals hall.

### How do I get to the ship?

Your job is to please get to our hospitality suite at the Marriott. Our job is to look after everything following including seamless transfer to your awaiting ship in Puntarenas. The shuttle to your ship will be ready at 12 pm and leaving 12:30 pm latest.

### What time can I board the ship?

Shortly after the shuttle arrives from San Jose. We will typically board between 1:30 and 2 pm to facilitate a relaxed and stress-free ocean crossing to Cocos.

### What's the crossing like?

It's an open ocean crossing to Cocos Island Costa Rica. It can be smooth or it might be rough or more likely, something in-between. The Explorer is our flagship that has steamed through everything, from the current-swept chilly waters of Alaska to adventuring down to Clipperton Atoll, just north of the equator. We highly recommend the scopolamine "patch" and a glass of red wine to relax and have a snooze on the crossing. During the trip, we anchor in the calm anchorage behind Cocos.



## ABOUT DIVING

### What dive experience is needed?

50 logged dives and advanced open water is the bare minimum experience required to safely dive around Cocos Island. More experience is better and all divers should have good buoyancy skills. The diving can be challenging. There could be strong current on some dives. Some of the dive sites are in open water and exposed to the swell. The difference between Cocos and a destination such as Socorro is that there is no navy base or airstrip on the island which means that airplane medevac is not possible. If you have a medical issue, the boat will have to return to port or at least be met part way by fast boat. For all these reasons, these trips are best suited for good experienced divers. Don't worry if you don't feel that you are quite ready yet for Cocos!! Come and visit us in Baja, Sea of Cortez and Socorro and we will get you all tuned and tweaked up for this great adventure!!!

### Do I need to dive with a dive guide?

Yes. At Cocos, current and visibility can change dramatically within several hours. If you were to surface unexpectedly mid-dive, there is the possibility of drifting away and needing to use your Nautilus LifeLine to get rescued. In addition to those challenges, local tiger sharks can show erratic behaviour around your safety stop at 15 feet and it's very important for our dive guides to keep a watchful eye on them. For all of these reasons, Cocos is a dive destination in which guests have to stay with our dive guides. Our dive guides are highly experienced and excellent and they will do their best to give you all the freedom and headspace you might be looking for in your diving, and of course, we are very focussed on giving shooters what they need (sorry, bad pun). Ultimately, your captain and dive guides are the final authority on whether a guest can do a specific dive or not.

### What are your safety protocols?

Safety, excellence in guest experience and happy staff and crew are the cornerstones of our business. Nothing is more important than your safety. At Nautilus, we are proud to be the only dive operation in the world with ISM certification and external annual audit of an SMS (Safety Management System). This is the same certification as the largest cruise ships on the oceans. We operate within written processes, procedures and checklists that our captains and crew are trained into both initially and annually. Every dive starts with a briefing on a white board. We require that all divers carry LifeLines marine rescue GPS, SMBs and dive alerts. We will loan you one of ours if you are missing any of this safety equipment. We carry AEDs and extensive medical kits with a contract medical officer available shoreside via our sophisticated satellite communication system. NOTE: because of the remoteness of Cocos Island, we highly recommend a medical checkup before leaving on this trip.

### How many dives can I expect?

Your dive schedule may vary according to weather, other dive boats and where the action is. You can generally expect 2 dives in the morning and 1 in the afternoon. Entry into the park is restricted and tightly controlled for diving allowing for not more than 65 divers in the park at any one time. An 11 days, 10 nights trip provides for 7 dive days, and 6 dive days for 10 days, 9 nights.

### Is there nitrox onboard?

Yes, and it's highly recommended for all divers. The cost is US\$ 120 per trip.

### Water temperature?

78- 82 °F (27 – 28 °C).

### Are the boats camera friendly?

YES, VERY! Ask about rental cameras and photo pro services.

## WHAT TO EXPECT

### What's the weather like and what clothes should I bring?

Well, it's the rainy season in the tropics!! We recommend casual and cool attire onboard (t-shirt and shorts). It can be drizzly in the afternoons and we recommend bringing a windbreaker and a fleece vest or sweater just in case. Make sure you bring good shoes if you are interested in going ashore for a hike. It's spectacular onshore. Just wait until you see the waterfalls!

### Is there internet and WhatsApp onboard?

Yes. Internet and WhatsApp connection are available for \$120 per trip. Please keep in mind that a satellite tracking system at sea only gives limited speed internet access. You won't be able to stream Netflix!!

### Is there a fuel surcharge?

Of course not! We figure that dive boat companies that with fuel, surcharges year-in, year-out are just taking an extra fee onto the trip.

### What's an appropriate crew tip?

US\$ 400 - \$500.

# Excursion Risk



**We are excited to have you join us, but feel compelled to point out [some of the risks](#) involved in going to sea on one of our ships.**

On a voyage like this, we are always at the whim of Mother Ocean. All of our ships are equipped with the latest in satellite technology, full time data links, internet at sea and marine radios. We can't control the weather but we can monitor the forecasts very carefully and our shoreside management team is in constant contact with the ships and available 24/7 in case of emergencies. We need you to be aware that there is always a risk of adverse weather, mechanical breakdown, errors or mistakes made by our crew, medical evacuations or other interruptions to your trip that are beyond our control.

You can be sure that we will do our best to protect the health and safety of our guests and crew including the following core principles; temperature and health monitoring -> personal hygiene with frequent hand washing, using sanitizer, not touching face, coughing or sneezing into one's elbow -> social distancing -> disinfecting with 1 week hold times using fogging machines -> isolation, or quarantine for possible cases. HOWEVER, we cannot promise that you won't come in contact with someone infected and we cannot promise that you won't potentially get sick.

Guests are responsible for their own dive safety. Our guides are not responsible for teaching primary dive skills or looking after guests who do not have basic buoyancy skills. Diving with marine animals entails risk. Scuba divers risk embolism, dehydration or other medical issues. Guests and crew alike are susceptible to accidents, tripping and falling, sprains or broken bones, heart attacks, stroke or medical conditions such as appendicitis, pancreatitis, diabetic complications, severe infections, abscesses or other emergency conditions.

We sincerely hope that none of our guests will ever have a medical emergency, but in the highly unlikely event that one occurs, we will provide basic first aid and arrange for medical consultation. Aerial medevacs are not possible from Cocos. In the event of a medical emergency we might be able to get a fast boat to help out. Otherwise, the ship will have to return to port. We highly recommend the purchase of trip interruption insurance to provide coverage for YOU so that another guest's medical emergency doesn't impact you financially.

In consideration of you allowing me to participate in your camping and/or whale watching and/or excursion (the "Excursion"):

I voluntarily waive, release and forever discharge NAUTILUS DIVE ADVENTURES AND/OR all its related entities: ICARUS AVIATION LTD also doing business as "Lever Diving" AND/OR NAUTILUS EXPLORER MEXICO, S. DE R.L DE C.V. AND/OR 3-101-878943 S.A. (collectively the "Company") and its employees, directors, officers, agents and contractors (collectively the "Operators") from any and all liability, including but not limited to liability arising from the negligence (including gross negligence) or fault of the Operators or any of them for personal injury or death, property loss or damage or any other claims of any kind which may occur to me during or in connection with the Excursion and/or the use or misuse of any equipment, vessels or vehicles.

I agree that all agreements made between the Operators and myself (including this Waiver) shall be governed by the laws of Canada and the courts of British Columbia shall have exclusive jurisdiction over any matter relating to the said agreements or this Waiver.

I agree that this Waiver shall be binding upon my heirs, executors, administrators, successors, assigns and my estate and I agree that in the event that a claim is made against the Operators or any one of them in respect of any cause of action relating to me, I will indemnify the Operator(s) for their losses, damage and expenses arising from such claim.

# Our Responsibilities, Your Responsibilities

## Our Responsibilities

- To ensure your safety.
- To give you the best possible diving experience.
- To treat you with respect and consideration and to provide excellence in service onboard.
- To be responsive to special requests and needs.
- To plan each trip with respect to weather, sea conditions and animal behavior in order to maximize your diving experience.
- To keep our ships in top condition, clean and in good mechanical repair. Please note that each ship has many complex systems and it may be impossible to prevent some maintenance problems during your trip, despite our best efforts.

## Your Responsibilities

### 1. Animals

We love Mother Ocean! Unfortunately, sometimes guests will demonstrate unsafe or irresponsible behavior towards animals that impedes other guest's experiences and/or may cause harm to the animals. It is your responsibility to follow the crew's directions and recommendations with respect to interaction with the animals. In the unlikely event that an individual is impeding other guests and/or causing harm to the animals, the captain will speak to that person and give them a formal warning. If the guest continues the same behavior, the captain has the authority to hold that guest out of the water for the remainder of the trip.

### 2. Diving Safety

It is your responsibility to attend dive briefings and comply with the principles of safe recreational diving. Deco diving or deliberately "going blue" is not allowed. The captain has the right to revoke the diving privileges of anyone who is diving in an unsafe manner.

### 3. Alcohol

With over many years of operational experience running charters, we have learned the safest alcohol policy is to restrict guests from bringing their own alcohol on board. We provide a wide selection of beer, wine and alcohol from the ship's bar at reasonable prices. We are also happy to hold your duty-free purchases or local purchases of alcohol in bond in the ship's storage until the end of your trip.

### 4. Government Rules

You must comply with all Costa Rican government rules and regulations. Please note that government regulations and laws may change without notice. Our contract with you is subject to "force majeure" without compensation.

### 5. Marijuana

Marijuana is illegal in Costa Rica including medicinal prescription marijuana. We have a zero tolerance policy regarding guests bringing marijuana onboard.

### 6. Illegal Substances

We maintain a zero tolerance for illegal narcotics or substances on board. We're required under Costa Rican law to report any problems to the Costa Rican Federal Police.

### 7. Crew

Treating our crew and staff with courtesy and respect.

### 8. Getting Sick

We sincerely hope that you stay healthy and don't get sick during your trip. Please let the crew know if you are not feeling well so that we can give you extra love and attention and also do our best to prevent anyone else onboard from getting sick.

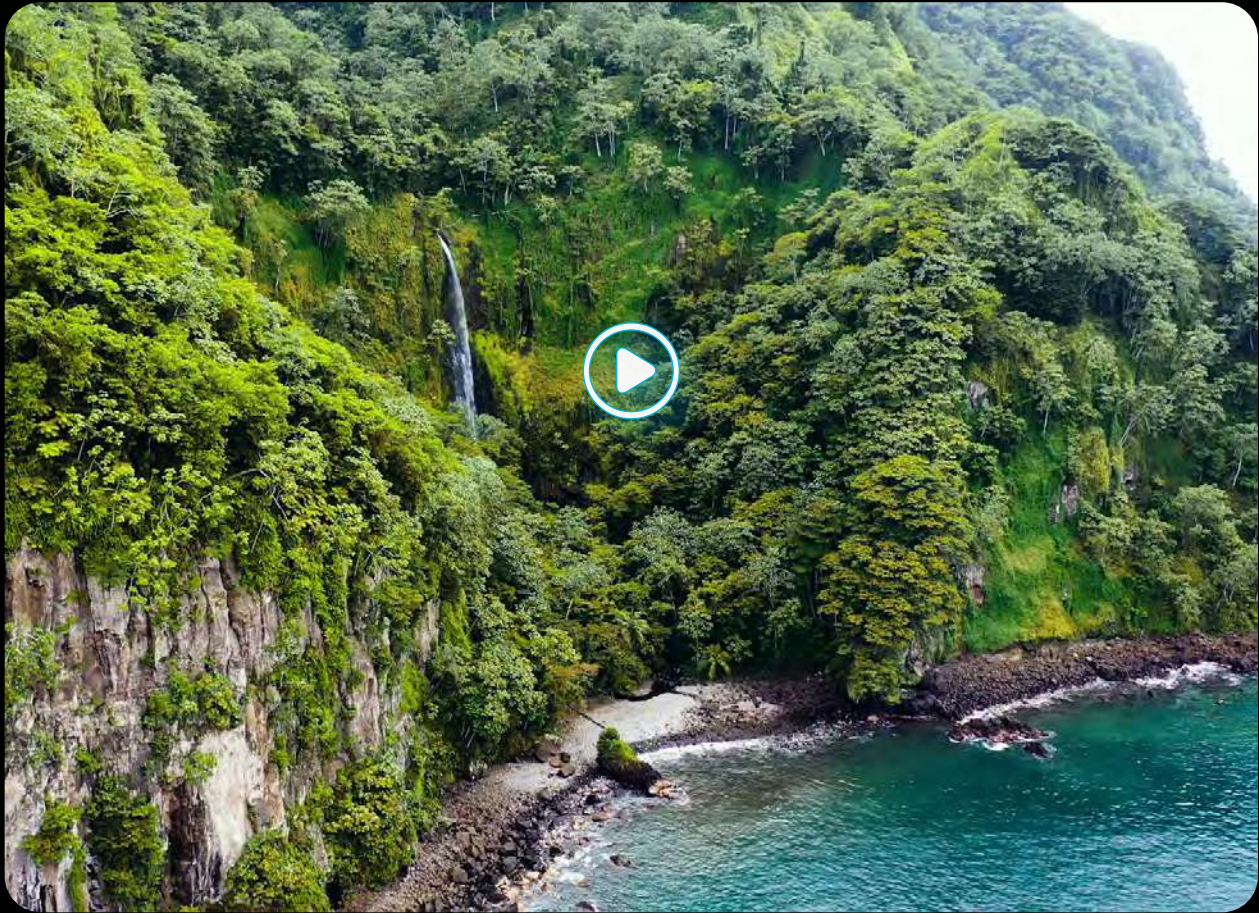

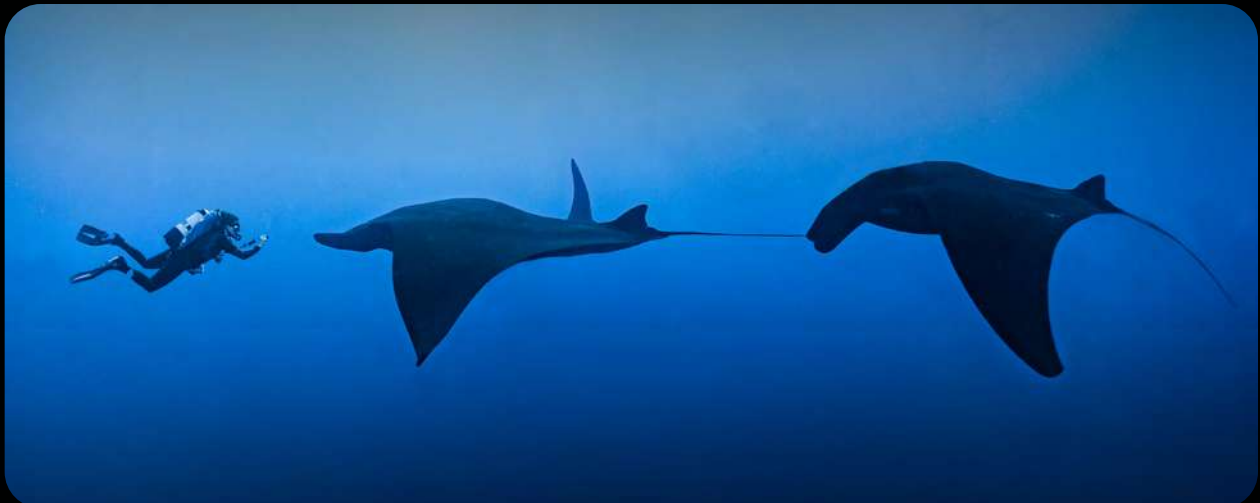


## Socorro Island Giant Mantas & Dolphins

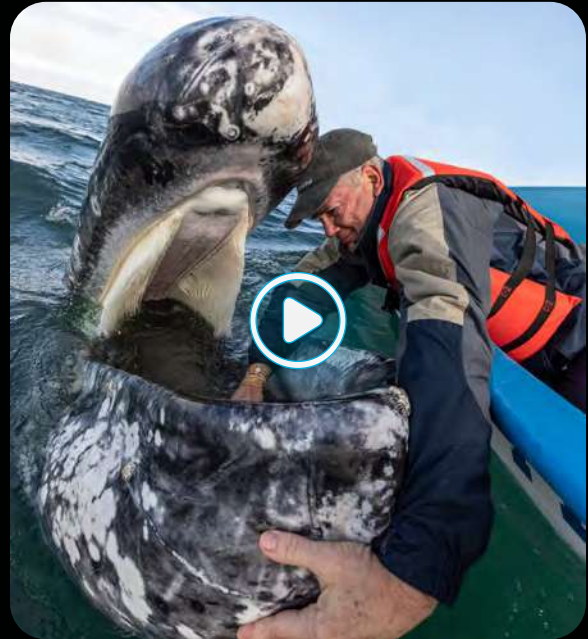
